Hip Hop's 45th Anniversary

The roots of hip hop can be best traced to August 11, 1973 when, at a back-to-school jam in the Bronx, a young DJ named Kool Herc experimented with playing only the parts of the songs that got the best response from the crowd – the instrumental parts, or, "the breaks." Paired with his friend Coke La Rock vocally interacting with the crowd on the microphone, a new sound was born. Hip hop quickly became a united label that reflected a growing culture of experimental urban music, dance, dress, and overall identity. It is an art form that questions, asserts, subverts and, most importantly, reflects the society in which it thrives. Through hip hop, many have been given a voice and a platform and this month, we celebrate and honor this great contribution to our greater American culture.

Drum Dream Girl by Margarita Engle (author) and Rafael López (illustrator) tells an inspiring true story. Beautifully illustrated, this story is based on the childhood of Millo Castro Zaldarriaga, a Chinese-African-Cuban girl who broke Cuba's traditional taboo against female drummers. Readers learn how the child, supported by her sisters and others, grew into a worldfamous drummer.

I tried to locate recorded music by Millo; but except for glimpses on YouTube, there seems to be nothing currently available. However, considering drum music that continues to inspire me, I was reminded of Gene Krupa's performance during the Benny Goodman Orchestra's historic 1938 Carnegie Hall performance. Most specifically, I love, love, love Sing, Sing, Sing (with Swing), a 12-minute number that I believe is one of the great musical performances of the 20th century.

This inspiring title is not only part of the Great Children's Book Collection at Burton Barr Central Library, but it can also be found in multiple formats, including video and spoken word for your viewing and listening pleasure. Music by Krupa, including Gene Krupa- 20th Century Drum Master, is also available on this database.

We just got a bunch of <u>great and varied music books</u> on the <u>Greater Phoenix Digital Library</u> that I'm looking forward to checking out. One of them is <u>The Blues</u>, part of the <u>Very Short Introduction Series</u>. I love these books because I've found they offer a pretty comprehensive look at a wide variety of topics. And they're short! They are easy to finish and you feel accomplished! There has been a lot of old American music playing in my house as of late, and I'd love to learn more about this genre and the history behind some of its important creators.

I just finished listening to <u>Born to Run</u>, narrated by The Boss himself! It was long but interesting. Bruce Springsteen describes his struggles with mental health, his bad relationship with his father, his personal life and, of course, his life as a musician. I was often struck by how well he writes and the poetic nature of his telling, but I guess that shouldn't surprise me as he is a fantastic songwriter! This <u>audiobook</u> just won an Audie Award for Best Autobiography and was nominated for a 2018 Grammy.

I always enjoy looking through music magazines, especially now that I can get them on my iPad. RBdigital has some of my favorites: Q and MOJO. These are expensive in print, so I love that we offer them digitally for free to our customers!

Music has the magic of uniting people across time, distance and differences. The beauty of music is its universality. Books for older kids that feature music as a main theme are sometimes hard to find, but these two titles are sure to be a hit with elementary and high school students.

Middle Grade: Echo by Pam Muñoz Ryan

Teen: Give Me Some Truth by Eric Gansworth

The story of Carson Mastick and Maggi Bokoni – two Native American teens navigating the ups and downs of coming-of-age – captures the universal experience of finding your identity while growing up and sometimes away from what you've always known. Although set in the 80s, this novel is chock full of Beatles nostalgia and rock and roll. <u>The Greatest Music Stories Never Told: 100 tales from music history to astonish, bewilder, and stupefy</u> by Rick Beyer

For fans of random historical moments or music trivia tidbits, Rick Beyer's title is sure to please. Each two-page spread enlightens readers on a specific time or place or person and how music played a role. Sometimes music itself is a character, sometimes the part is minor, but each of the 100 stories has a musical tie. Great for conversation starters at a cocktail party, or to win the next round of trivia, this title is available in physical format, as well as in eBook format on the Greater Phoenix Digital Library or hoopla.

The History of Music in Fifty Instruments by Philip Wilkinson

Taking a slightly different approach, <u>The History of Music in Fifty Instruments</u> chronologically focuses on the woodwind, brass, percussion and string sections of an orchestra. With little motifs of information and illustrations including paintings and photographs, this title is much more than a musical encyclopedia. Written by the <u>author</u> of books on design and also of titles in the DK Eyewitness series, this book is a beautiful and informative tour of the orchestra and beyond.

And for a little bit of fun, try looking for your favorite instrument in each of our catalogs and eResource platforms. If the <u>ukulele</u> makes you smile, you will find close to 100 books, DVDs and CDs in the <u>Phoenix Public Library catalog</u>.
